Infant abuse alleged

Infant abuse alleged MANAMA: A baby girl has been admitted to hospital in a critical condition following a heart attack, it was revealed yesterday. She received emergency treatment to activate her heart muscles before being admitted to Salmaniya Medical Complex's intensive care unit, Chief Prosecutor Nayef Yusuf Mohammed said. She was also found suffering from swelling of the brain and haemorrhage and a multi-layered retinal haemorrhage, raising her doctor's suspicions that the month-and-a-half-old baby was being abused. Investigations also revealed injury marks on her body. Her father, who is a doctor working at a private clinic, while her mother, also a doctor, was admitted to the Psychiatric Hospital for evaluation. Full report - Page 2
