Chief Prosecutor and Special Investigation Unit Head Nawaf Hamza has stated that eight mistreatment complaints were received in August.

He explained that the unit heard the complainants and recorded the testimonies of witnesses, in addition to referring one of them to the coroner.

Mr. Hamza affirmed that the unit is following up investigations in previous cases,

including the case of a policeman videotaping a defendant while confessing that he was incited to kill policemen.

The video which was being circulated through social Media, shows a Bahraini defendant half naked and being interrogated by a policeman. The video which was taken

and uploaded by the policeman on June 11 elicited strong reactions, claiming it a clear violation of human rights.

Public Security Chief Major General Tariq Al Hassan stated on the same day that the policeman was suspended from duty and referred to investigation.

Mr. Hamza assured

that the prosecution spares no effort in protecting defendants’ rights, by applying international standards of human rights protection and punishing the violators.

He added that the unit is concerned with detecting crime by all means, such as monitoring websites and social Media networks.

More speed bumps in Kingdom soon

Works Ministry Road Planning Director Kadhem Abdulateef has stated that 140 speed bumps will be constructed in various locations around the Kingdom.

Mr. Abdulateef explained

that Speed Bumps Committee received 304 requests from five Municipal Councils to construct bumps. The committee includes representatives of Works Ministry, Interior Ministry General Directorate for Traffic and Municipal Councils.
